WHO RESCUES THE RESCUER?

That was a phrase I first heard in ACP school many years ago, it was referring to scene safety, but they failed to mention scene safety also included mental health and traumatic stress. This is a tough one for us prehospital providers, we often talk about it like its taboo, like it only happens to others. Well, let me ask you. When it comes to mental health and traumatic stress who rescues us? We can. We can by talking about it.

Hi, I'd like to take a quick moment to introduce myself. I'm Lyle Barron, I work for APL in the flight division in Peace River. I've been with APL for 2 years. I started EMS in 1994 as a PCP in Nova Scotia and became an NREMT-P in 1996 at the Center for Emergency Medicine of Western Pennsylvania. I've spent 19 years working in cities as well as rural areas of Nova Scotia as a Senior Operations Paramedic. In 2011 I migrated to Industrial work in Alberta and have since moved here, now living in Edmonton for the past 3 years. I'd like to talk about something very personal for me as I'm sure it will be for some of you as well, mental health in our industry. We all have wondered about this at some point, and lots of us struggle with how to deal with the traumas we face daily.

My first bout of PTSD occurred only a few years into my career. I was 24 years old, working in NS. I was one of very few ACP's the province had back then, I was a Senior Operations Paramedic "fancy word for team lead" and worked on the side as a quality control medic for the province, had a new house and my son was only a month old. Life was good! One sunny day in early June my partner and I were called to back up a BLS crew for a 14yo F who was swimming and carrying on with friends at the lake when they noticed she hadn't surfaced. The fire department was quick to respond and when we arrived on the scene the fire department and BLS crew were just bringing her to shore. She'd been submerged for 20 mins in fresh water and was VSA. We did our work and after about 5mins got ROSC. The ambulance ride to the hospital would take about 30mins and as I sat in the airway seat bagging this 14yo girl things started to settle in. First, I realized she was my neighbor; she came from a very loving and kind family and worst of all she is most likely brain dead. If this could happen to somebody's daughter what could happen to my infant son? I had so many thoughts racing through my brain from these world-crumbling realities to running the call that I barely remember hearing the siren wailing. As we transferred to care at the regional hospital I was still in the room when a nurse guided her parents in. I saw my neighbors holding each other, crying and almost scared to approach their daughter. I left the room, walked outside to the front of the ambulance, folded both arms on the hood, put my head down, and started to cry. I didn't even know at the time why I was crying. I finished my shift, went home, and cried more. I couldn't sleep, I doubted my career path and I felt lost.

Luckily, I had close family that got me to a therapist. I resisted the process and was mad at myself for not being "tough enough" as the culture was back then. Life went on, as did my career, but it was not easy, life seemed

dark and I was becoming angry at the world. Fortunately, my family was persistent, and I ended up with a great therapist who helped me gain insight and tools to live a happier more fulfilling life as a career paramedic. Now don't get me wrong, I've had many episodes of Traumatic Stress since then, and some have been very bad but I have the tools and support network in place now, I can lean on my support network, my therapist, my partner, my family, and friends.

I saw and continue to see paramedics and nurses suffering in the pre-hospital world. I've lost too many friends and colleagues to not mention my story. We have many faces here at APL, from northern remote clinics, ground ambulances, flights, events, etc. We all face unique challenges regardless of the division. So, I'd like to take a moment to say to you all, please look out for yourselves and each other. Don't hesitate to seek help if you or somebody you know is in need. The work you do is critical, the things we see can't be unseen. We as nurses and medics see the worst of humanity and oftentimes, we're it, there's no higher level of care for us until our patient gets to the hospital. That responsibility alone is stressful.

So please remember it's ok to not be ok. Please look out for yourselves, look out for each other. Don't be afraid to talk about it. Reach out. We are working hard to have a Peer Support Program in place very soon to bridge the time gap in getting to a therapist or other mental health professionals, we have many options available for help already through EAP, and AHS Peer support as well as national numbers for mental health and suicide prevention.

We are all in this chosen profession of prehospital care together, let's look after each other!






IT TALKS


